In January, I tallied all the parks and outdoor spaces in and around Birmingham that Carrie and/or I took Sadie to in 2020 after we moved here at the start of August. If you count Valley's own walking trail and playground, we made it to eighteen different outdoor spaces in twenty-two weeks—a new one almost every week! Carrie and I also spent our New Year's Day taking a tour of several murals that Birmingham is justly well-regarded for, and we have many more locations on our list for 2021.

I have said this many times by now, but I know these are not the circumstances any of us imagined our time together being like, at least initially. But I am grateful that my family and I are not only here, but have made a regular practice of exploring so many different places and spaces. Finally, I am excited to share that Lola Kiser and I have been hard at work these past few weeks building the first-person theme of last Advent's devotional book into a Lenten sermon series and Holy Week devotional book! Beginning Sunday, February 21, I will be preaching through the Passion story using perspectives of several key characters, while other characters are given voice in this year's Holy Week devotions.

I look forward to experiencing my first Lenten season alongside all of you as your minister.



BUILDING VALLEY MACEDONIA HISTORY – PART TWO

The first event after our organizational meeting was a trip for members of both churches to the recently built Civil Rights Institute. Many of us were living in Birmingham during the sixties and had experienced the fear, the physical and emotional distress, and the violence that permeated the city. The tour of the Institute was led by Rev. Lewis of Macedonia and Rev. Clifford of Valley. After lunch they led us in a discussion of our memories and our reactions to what we had seen at the Institute. The day was an educational experience, although painful, and also an opportunity for us to get acquainted with each other. At the conclusion of this workshop we all agreed that such shared events were important and should continue.

In preparation for Easter of the following year the group sponsored joint worship services: Maundy Thursday and supper at Valley, Easter morning and breakfast at Macedonia. These services were alternated between churches each year and they have continued until the present. Several times the ministers exchanged pulpits on Sunday and on at least two occasions the members of one church attended the Sunday worship service of the other.

Service projects have always been an important part of Building Valley Macedonia, now called BVM. One of our objectives was to choose projects that would show to the community that people of both races could work together in harmony and love toward a common goal. To that end, we volunteered our group to work with Habitat for Humanity in renovating older houses. We were told that ours was the first mixed racial group in our area working with Habitat, although there had been other groups of each race separately helping with Habitat projects. A picture of one house we worked on is located on the table in the library.

One of our most successful projects was a tutoring program each Monday night at Macedonia for elementary school students in the areas of reading, mathematics, history and English. Children from both churches, as well as from the neighborhood, attended. Rev. Lewis used the Macedonia van to provide transportation to anyone who needed it. Following the study sessions we always offered everyone a light supper.

Led by “Miss” Maggie Bristow of Macedonia and Rev. Carl Flock, our retired Regional Minister, we pieced a quilt top and then quilted it by meeting on one Saturday each month. After many stuck fingers and lots of fellowship, the quilt was finished and given to a needy family at a special dedicatory service at Macedonia. A picture of the quilt now hangs in our church office.
