MEDITATION

Sunday, August 23, 2020

“Paul and the Philippians”

In the New Testament, Paul’s major ministry was starting new churches in metropolitan areas. If Paul were alive today, he would be going to places like New York, Los Angeles, Chicago and Atlanta to begin new churches. After developing a community of believers in the cities of his day, establishing leaders, and teaching them the gospel, he would then move on to begin the work again in another area. But, as a good pastor, Paul tried to stay in contact with the churches he started. The New Testament book we call Philippians is one of the churches that he stayed in touch with.

He loved the Philippian church. Philippians is the only letter that we have in the scriptures in which Paul is not trying to correct bad teaching or bad behavior in the church. Instead, the letter highlights Paul’s personal affection for the Philippian church. He considers the Philippian congregation not just members in his care but friends in his heart.

Paul wrote this letter while beaten and imprisoned in Rome, awaiting his execution. During this time in prison, he wrote to the Philippians, “Rejoice in the Lord always.” (4:4) How can Paul write that? Because long before he was thrown into prison, Paul decided how he would respond. He made up his mind how to stand firm in his faith.

I would like to offer some thoughts that Paul shared with the Philippians in order for them to stand firm in their faith. Maybe they can be helpful to us. First, Paul says to the Philippians, “Do not worry about anything”. (Philippians 4:6). Isn’t that crazy? That must be the most difficult command to obey. If someone were to come to me saying that he lost his job and was going through bankruptcy, could you imagine simply saying, “Don’t worry about it?” That would be crazy. So how does Paul get away with it? Because it is not an emotion that Paul is commanding. It is a relationship with God. When that breaks down, worry increases because most worry is not trusting God.

Second, Paul calls us to stand firm in our thoughts. He said, “Whatever is true, whatever is honorable, whatever is just, whatever is pure, whatever is pleasing, whatever is commendable, if there is any excellence and if there is anything worthy of praise, think about these things.” (Philippians 4:8)

We become what we think. Proverbs 28.7 says, “As a man thinks in his heart, so is he.” We become what we think. This has always been an issue. Our minds are being polluted by our culture as they were in Philippi. Therefore, Paul is saying, if you want to stand firm in the Lord, then guard your thoughts. Ask yourself, “Is it true, pure, just, acceptable?”

Third, Paul calls us to stand firm in our confidence. He says, “I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me.” (Philippians 4:13) This is one of my favorite scriptures. For it lifts up that our Savior not only lives within us but that He also pours His power into us. And that alone is enough to make us confident. Sometimes we are weak and try to be confident without Christ. We try to substitute other words for Christ. Consider the following examples:

“I can do all things through education”. No

“I can do all things through money”. No

“I can do all things through friends”. No

“I can do all things through positive thinking”. No

Nothing else will fit. Only through Christ can we do all things.

Why? Because nothing and no one else is able to empower us and provide the strength we need.

Finally, Paul calls us to stand firm by forgetting the past. He says, “Forgetting those things that are past, forgetting what lies behind, I press on”. (Philippians 3:14)

Too many of us are living in the past. We are receiving too much emotional satisfaction from what went on yesterday. God is calling us to serve Him in the present and in the future. Remember that there is a reason for your windshield being bigger than the rearview mirror. Your future matters more than your past.

There are only a few scriptures in the magnificent book of Philippians that will help us stand firm in the Lord. We are grateful to Paul for his words that shape our lives in Christ Jesus.
