Coffee and a Story

I found myself thinking as I drove home from the church building one afternoon this past week, "September here is worth waiting for."

That isn't something I have found myself saying much at all in my life. As a kid, even a nerdy goofball like me would still mourn the end of the freedom of summer. Then, as an adult living on the West Coast, September meant the imminent arrival of October's rains that would generally continue through the winter and well into the spring.

Here, the weather still very much looms large—we are at the very peak of hurricane season, and only days removed from Ida's destruction in Louisiana, Mississippi, and New York—but I find myself looking forward to September now anyways. And not just because of football season, or even my anniversary here as your minister, although that is surely on my heart as well.

It is because that is one thing that being here in Birmingham with all of you has gotten me to experience differently. I experience the autumn differently here. And I have enjoyed that difference.

I have said it many times to y'all already but it feels worth saying again: we have experienced a profound amount of change these past two years. A new minister represents a sea change. The pandemic represented a sea change. We experienced both simultaneously.

So much is different now, and not much of it has been easy. But in this changing of seasons, I am reminded that sometimes, change also bears good fruit. And as things continue to change, I hope that you experience the goodness of the fruits we have chosen to harvest together so far—a brand-new way of doing adult Sunday School that Lola Kiser has ushered in, or the ability to worship with us on a Sunday you might not otherwise have been able to before because you were out of town.

I want to emphasize how important I think those things are. In a time when so much has been made more difficult and dangerous—travel, celebrations, concerts, and much more—we chose to make it easier and more accessible to experience Valley through things like online worship and one-month commitments to Sunday School classes. That is a meaningful, spiritually edifying thing for us to offer in this moment, and I want to take this time, in this newsletter space, to commend us for that, and to encourage us to keep drawing from that well together.

I look forward to seeing you—in-person or online—on Sunday mornings at 9:30 for education and 10:30 for worship. Each are, I think and hope, worth waiting for.
