A Word from Your Pastor

Many of us cross the Cahaba River on the Highway 280 bridge. For some of us it is a daily crossing and for others a few times a week. As we cross the river and look upstream toward the east, the river is calm and peaceful. It looks like a perfect spot for spending a summer afternoon floating down the river in a canoe. But if we look down the river on the west side, we see a waterfall and few rough spots in the river. Not the best place for a calm float on the Cahaba.

The Highway 280 bridge over the Cahaba with the river's peaceful side and hard side is an illustration of life. If it were up to me I would choose the quiet and calm waters. But as I read the scripture I am reminded that Christ would choose the rough waters, the hard side.

When you read the New Testament accounts of Jesus' life, you discover that the road that Jesus chose to travel was the one that left to suffering and difficulty. He chose the hard way. He could have escaped a great deal of suffering. He could have played it safe as His disciples wished Him to do, and voiced the suffering of His last week on earth in Jerusalem. But His life and mission would have been a failure if He had. A suffering world needed a suffering Savior.

And for some good reason, God has given to all of us the desire to follow this example of Jesus and choose the hard way of struggle. Worthwhile projects, truly regarding achievements that capture our interest and demand our best, always seem to involve struggle. To be with a loved one or friend through difficult days brings us satisfaction.

To give oneself on behalf of another is to enter into deep joy. By giving ourselves for others, even though that is a harder way, we gain a deeper appreciation of life and become closer to God. If we try to plan a life that avoids struggle, and always do things the easy way, then life loses its zest and we find ourselves questioning our way, purpose and being.

There are times when I want to cry out to God and say "Why must I choose the hard way?" Then I think of the Apostle Paul who rejoiced in life in which he was beaten with rods, shipwrecked, and stoned, yet achieved a sense of satisfaction and came to the end of his life saying: "I have fought the good fight and run the race and I press on toward the goal of Jesus Christ." Without a battle there is no victory and without a hard way there is no life.

Just maybe during Lent God is calling us to get up and choose the hard way. The way of the cross and following Jesus in making sacrifices for His way of life. May we remember in choosing the hard way that the cross keeps reminding us that difficulty is no excuse for refusal. Serving Christ is tough, but He calls us to the task. God Bless You, Edd
