Belle Mont Mansion Tuscumbia, Alabama

On Wednesday, September 25, 2024, the AAA Valley Seniors will tour the Belle Mont Mansion in Tuscumbia, AL. We will leave the church at 9:00 am arriving at the house at 11:00 am. The gas fee is \$8.00; admission to the Mansion is \$6.00 per person. Belle Mont Mansion is a Historic House Museum, built in 1828 in pre-Civil War times, by Alexander Mitchell from Virginia, who grew up living close to Thomas Jefferson's Monticello. Belle Mont is one of Alabama's crowning architectural achievements and is one of the few outstanding Palladian-style houses in the Deep South. The design is that of Italian Renaissance architect Andrea Palladian with a direct influence from Thomas Jefferson. With over 100 enslaved people, Mitchell was the owner of the area's largest cotton plantation. In 1833 Mitchell sold the property and moved to Philadelphia. Update on Visioning Process

When we set out for a trip or journey, most of us have a pretty good idea of where we are going. What comes next is the how we are going to get to our destination. Are we going to fly, take a train, drive, walk or hitch-hike? And then comes what will we need: an airline, a train, a car, comfortable shoes or a handy thumb?

A vision is the destination, it is where we are going or planning to go. For a church we need to know where we are going before we can make plans on how to get there and what we will need to make it all happen.

To that end, we have been working since our January planning meeting to discern a vision for Valley Christian Church (Disciples of Christ). It began by meeting with the elders to engage in a time of intentional prayer seeking God's wisdom and guidance and out of that came the survey which was presented to the congregation in July. It was then the congregation's turn to pray over the questions and provide answers that would help us move closer to discerning the vision God has for our church. The responses we received were thoughtful and gave us a foundation from which to begin to develop a vision.

We used the survey responses to craft a working vision statement which is different than a mission statement.

A vision statement is the destination, in our case the why are we here question. Why has God placed us here at this moment, in this place for what purpose?

A mission statement provides the how to the vision statement. How will we reach that vision. It is like the road map leading us to our vision.

The final piece of the triad is ministry, the what. What are we going to do to make this all happen. This is the nuts and bolts of what we do.

We start with why, move to how and then to what. Vision, mission, ministry.

We are at the point now where we can develop the vision statement for Valley Christian Church (Disciples of Christ). We used the survey responses to help formulate a working statement which will be the focus of the meeting scheduled for September 15 after worship. It is at this meeting that we will seek input and guidance from you, the very ones who will be called to implement this vision going forward. This is an important first step as we seek to discern God's plans for this church both now and into the future, so I invite you to attend this meeting, to give your input and to be a part of this new song we are singing as we seek to be positive difference makers in our community and world.

Below are the top answers to the survey questions and at the end is the draft of the vision statement. I ask you first to pray over this information and then look at the vision statement and offer your insights at the meeting in September.

What do you believe are the strengths of Valley Christian Church:

Friendliness/Family Oriented/Fellowship. Outreach oriented.

What do you believe are the weaknesses of Valley Christian Church:

Lack of children/youth/young adults/age diversity. Lack of visibility.

What do you wish people knew about Valley Christian Church:

Welcoming/Friendly/Family oriented. Outreach oriented.

What do you tell others about Valley Christian Church:

Small but friendly and caring. Welcoming and inclusive.

What would you like to be able to tell others about Valley Christian Church:

We are growing and have youth/young adult ministries.

Name one ministry you would like Valley Christian Church engaged in now:

Contact based ministries; home maintenance, visiting nursing homes, adopt a school/classroom, be an adoptive grandparent/mentor, adopt a family with housing insecurity.

What would you like to see Valley Christian Church doing in five years:

Family oriented ministries; Sunday School, Vacation Bible School, teaching with vibrant music and exciting ministries.
