I have learned that it is easier to judge people than to forgive them. The role of judge is a role we play constantly. Ministers judge their colleagues and their congregations and in turn are themselves judged by those same colleagues and congregations. Husbands judge their wives and wives their husbands. Parents criticize their teenagers and teenagers criticize their parents. Students and teachers judge one another. Blacks and whites judge one another. You and I are constantly making judgements about the television programs we see and the sermons we hear and the music we listen to and the books we read and the products we use. We sit in judgement of persons, of institutions, of ideas, and of the weather. Judgement takes over our lives.

The bible leads us away from this role of being a judge that sometimes consumes us. It does not see us as judges, but sees God alone as the judge. The bible sees us as forgiven sinners. Therefore the only attitude we can take toward our fellow sinners whom God has pardoned is an attitude of forgiveness. We should not be judging but forgiving. Forgiveness is the only appropriate attitude in view of our own status as forgiven sinners.

Jesus calls you and me to be forgivers and peacemakers in our homes, in our churches, in our neighborhoods, and wherever we find ourselves. Jesus tells us to leave the judging to God and to get on with the forgiving.

We need to remember the message of the cross. On the cross Jesus accepted into His body and spirit the punishment for sin. Therefore since the punishment for sin has already been given to our crucified Lord, you and I do not need to go around punishing people with our criticisms and complaints. We need to remember that the price of not forgiving can be very high. That price can be loneliness. It can be a lifetime of bitterness. It can be negative emotions which can destroy a person's body. The price of our refusals to forgive can be extremely high.

Finally, Jesus was a human being who knew how to forgive. How He did it will certainly be helpful to us. Here is an example of how he handled judgement and forgiveness. One day they brought to Jesus a woman caught in the act of adultery. They wanted him to judge the case. Should she be stoned in accordance with the Law of Moses, they asked? What do you say, Jesus? He stood up and said to them, "Let Him who is without sin among you be the first to throw a stone at her". When they heard it, they went away and Jesus was left along with the woman standing before Him. Jesus looked up and said to her, "Woman, where are they? Has no one judged and condemned you?" She said, "No one Lord". And Jesus said, "Neither Do I judge or condemn you. Go and do not sin again". God Bless You, Edd

# **Please Say Yes**


It is that time of the year to nominate new leaders for 2023. The nominating committee is Ed Guindon,
